I want to make you a promise today: If you can learn and master the four principles in our text, your job will never be the same. The tedium, tension, and labor will give way to a higher motive that will bring authentic joy and deep satisfaction.

# Take This Job and Love It 1 Peter 2:18-21

As Peter addresses slaves in the ancient Roman world, let's apply it to a much more modern and humane situation - your place of employment.

If you are no longer in the work place, you no doubt know someone who is.

This is good material to pass it on to people you know that may be struggling in the workplace

# Take This Job and Love It 1 Peter 2:18-21

50 percent of Christians have never heard a sermon on work

70 percent have never had a theology of work or vocation

If you learn these principles and they become part of the fabric of your work ethic, it will change your work life

1. A Practical Command (v. 18a)

You could translate *servants* as *slaves*; slaves were the workforce of the Roman Empire

The word *master* is *despotés*, somebody who has unlimited and absolute authority over another person

1. A Practical Command (v. 18a)

Slavery 2,000 years ago was an established institution; half of the Roman Empire was slaves

Some masters were great masters; others were not

#### Aristotle

"A slave is a living tool, just as a tool is an inanimate slave"

#### Roman nobleman

"The only thing that distinguishes a slave from a beast or a cart is that a slave can talk"

The New Testament taught enough principles that eventually slavery was undermined in the Roman Empire

Other anti-slavery movements came up, usually led by Christians: William Wilberforce, John Newton

1. A Practical Command (v. 18a)

Principle #1: work hard and work well

Be the kind of worker that any employer would want to hire

"With all fear" (v. 18) = respect; don't be bitter or negative

2.A <u>Potential Complication</u> (vv. 18b, 20)

Not every boss is good or gentle

Harsh (v. 18) is the Greek word skolios, a twisted person

2.A Potential Complication (vv. 18b, 20)

Principle #2: life is a mix of good and bad; use both to advertise

We as believers should be thankful we have jobs
Beyond that, you should say, "I believe the Lord put
me here"; it elevates your position and changes your
attitude

Principle #2: life is a mix of good and bad; use both to advertise

Believers ought to have an attitude of gratitude Gratitude is the attitude that sets the altitude for living and for working

# 3.A Powerful Consideration (vv.19-20)

If you're a bad worker and you get punished for it, so what? You deserve it

But when you do good and suffer, if you take it patiently, God is really pleased with that

Why do you work?

To please God

American workers admitted to goofing off 20 percent of the time

Sometimes the suffering you have is undeserved In that case, be patient and endure

This is commendable with God

Daniel: Daniel 6

Joseph: Genesis 39; 50:20

How can a person live victoriously when treated like this?

Principle #3: take God to work with you

Be the kind of worker whose eye is on the Lord, not

on the clock

Leave at the end of the day saying, "I worked for God today"

"God needs violins to send His music into the world, and if any violins are defective, God's music will be spoiled" —Antonio Stradivari

4.A Personal Calling (v. 21)

The good news? You were called to this
You are following a suffering Savior, which means
you're going to be called to suffer

Philippians 3:10

Principle #4: God's plan isn't that you just show up,
but that you grow up
This job isn't just to satisfy you or supplement you; it's
to shape you

Three Benefits of Suffering

Suffering keeps you pure

Suffering keeps you <a href="https://humble">humble</a>; 2 Corinthians 12:7-10

Suffering keeps you dependent

Your prayer life is never better than when life hurts
Is it any wonder that God allows or prescribes periods
of suffering?

Does the process hurt? Yes, but the submission brings a great sense of freedom at the end
